- The estimated food insecurity rate for Campbell County is **12.6%**, compared to 15.5% for the state.<sup>27</sup>
- From 2010 to 2016, the number of grocery stores decreased by 12.0%, from 25 to 22 stores.<sup>16</sup>
- In 2013-2015, **23.6%** (20.3%-27.0%) of adults ages 20 and over reported no leisure time physical activity.<sup>24</sup>
- The Urban Institute estimates that 15% of people in Campbell County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had medical debt in collections compared to 27% for the state as a whole.<sup>10</sup>
- **11.8%** (7.5%-18.1%) of adults reported that there was a time in past year when they needed to see a doctor but could not because of the cost.<sup>25</sup>



In 2016, Campbell County's official poverty rate was 12.5% (10.6% - 14.4%), compared to 18.2% (17.9% - 18.6%) for the state as a whole.<sup>8</sup>

- In 2017, there were **61** child care centers in Campbell County. Of these **47** were STARS certified.<sup>9</sup>
- Between 2012-2016, **3.8%** (+/-0.5%) of people ages 5 and over spoke a language other than English at home.<sup>7</sup>
- The Urban Institute estimates that 18% people in Campbell County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had student loan debt compared to 16% for the state.<sup>10</sup>




