- The estimated food insecurity rate for Kenton County is **12.8%**, compared to 15.5% for the state.<sup>27</sup>
- From 2010 to 2016, the number of grocery stores increased by 18.4%, from 38 to 45 stores.<sup>16</sup>
- In 2013-2015, **21.8%** (19.2%-24.4%) of adults ages 20 and over reported no leisure time physical activity.<sup>24</sup>
- The Urban Institute estimates that 15% of people in Kenton County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had medical debt in collections compared to 27% for the state as a whole.<sup>10</sup>
- **10.9%** (8.1%-14.6%) of adults reported that there was a time in past year when they needed to see a doctor but could not because of the cost.<sup>25</sup>



- County are **projected** to **increase** by **66.7%** compared to 51.9% for the state as a whole.<sup>3</sup>





In 2016, Kenton County's official poverty rate was 12.6% (11.0% - 14.2%), compared to 18.2% (17.9% - 18.6%) for the state as a whole.<sup>8</sup>

- In 2017, there were 95 child care centers in Kenton County. Of these 73 were STARS certified.<sup>9</sup>
- Between 2012-2016, **3.9%** (+/-0.4%) of people ages 5 and over spoke a language other than English at home.<sup>7</sup>
- The Urban Institute estimates that 20% people in Kenton County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had student loan debt compared to 16% for the state.<sup>10</sup>

- The total farm production expenses (average per farm) was **\$20,654** compared to \$62,002 for the state.<sup>13</sup>
- In Kenton County, there were **332** hired farm labor workers on **91** farms.<sup>13</sup>
- **91.7%** of farms were operated by a family or an individual compared to 91.0% for the state.<sup>13</sup>




