- The estimated food insecurity rate for Laurel County is **15.9%**, compared to 15.5% for the state.²⁷
- From 2010 to 2016, the number of grocery stores decreased by 35.3%, from 17 to 11 stores.¹⁶
- In 2013-2015, **31.6%** (27.7%-35.9%) of adults ages 20 and over reported no leisure time physical activity.²⁴
- The Urban Institute estimates that **35%** of people in Laurel County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had medical debt in collections compared to 27% for the state as a whole.¹⁰
- 15.0% (9.6%-22.7%) of adults reported that there was a time in past year when they needed to see a doctor but could not because of the cost.²⁵

- From 2010 to 2017, the total population in Laurel County increased by 1,325 people.²
- Between April 2010 and June 2017, there was an estimated **net in migration** of **320** people.⁴

- From 2017 to 2025, the total population in Laurel County is **projected** to **increase** by **2,418** people.³





In 2016, Laurel County's official poverty rate was 23.2% (19.8% - 26.6%), compared to 18.2% (17.9% - 18.6%) for the state as a whole.⁸

- In 2017, there were **10** child care centers in Laurel County. Of these **7** were STARS certified.⁹
- Between 2012-2016, **1.3%** (+/-0.4%) of people ages 5 and over spoke a language other than English at home.⁷
- The Urban Institute estimates that 15% people in Laurel County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had student loan debt compared to 16% for the state.¹⁰



In 2012, the total market value of agricultural products sold in Laurel County was \$15,278,000.¹³

- Of the total market value of agricultural products sold, 41.5% was the value of crops and 58.5% was the value of livestock, poultry, and their products.¹³
- The total farm production expenses (average per farm) was **\$18,949** compared to \$62,002 for the state.¹³
- In Laurel County, there were 628 hired farm labor workers on 223 farms.¹³
- 93.2% of farms were operated by a family or an individual compared to 91.0% for the state.¹³

* A farm must sell at least \$5,000 to be defined as a farm operation.

- Between 2012 and 2016, of the 21,908 (+/- 884) workers ages 16 and over, 75.7% (+/- 2.5%) worked inside the county, **23.4%** (+/-0.6%) worked outside the county and **1.0%** (+/-0.6%) worked outside Kentucky.⁷
- Between 2012 and 2016, 4.4% (+/-1.2%) of workers ages 16 and over who worked full-time year round were below poverty compared to 3.5% (+/- 0.1%) for the state as a whole.⁷
- 5.7% of 2016 HS graduates in the county earned an industry certificate compared to 19.2% for the state.¹⁹




