

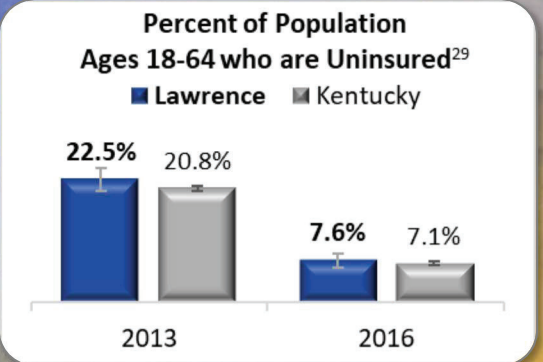

- The estimated food insecurity rate for Lawrence County is **17.3%**, compared to 15.5% for the state.²⁷
- From 2010 to 2016, the number of grocery stores **decreased** by **25.0%**, from **4** to **3** stores.¹⁶
- In 2013-2015, **38.2%** (32.2%-44.1%) of adults ages 20 and over reported no leisure time physical activity.²⁴
- The Urban Institute estimates that **37%** of people in Lawrence County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had medical debt in collections compared to 27% for the state as a whole.¹⁰
- **13.4%** (8.5%-20.6%) of adults reported that there was a time in past year when they needed to see a doctor but could not because of the cost.²⁵

The overall goals for the Community Assessments are:

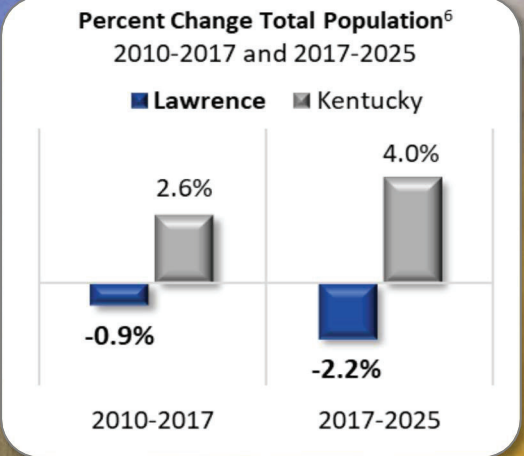
- To gain a better understanding of the county's pressing issues;

- From 2010 to 2017, the total population in Lawrence County **decreased** by **-141** people.²
- Between April 2010 and June 2017, there was an estimated **net out migration** of **-121** people.⁴
- In 2016, the composition of Lawrence County's population is estimated to be **96.9%** White, **0.3%** Black/African American, **0.2%** Asian, **1.6%** other and 2 or more races, and **1.0%** Hispanic.⁵
- From 2017 to 2025, the total population in Lawrence County is **projected** to **decrease** by **-341** people.³
- As baby boomers are entering retirement, between 2010 and 2025 the population ages 65 and over in Lawrence County are **projected** to **increase** by **44.1%** compared to 51.9% for the state as a whole.³

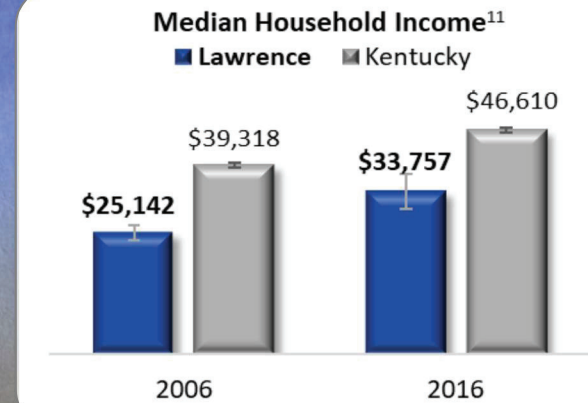

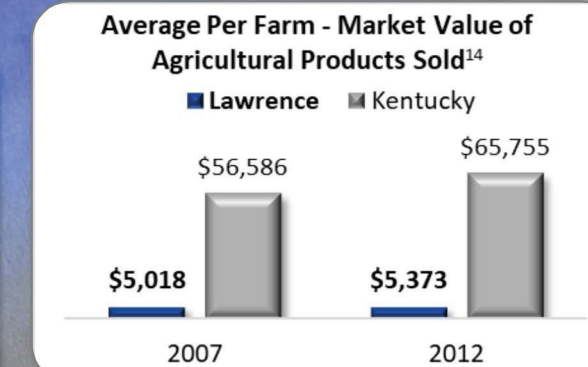

- In 2016, Lawrence County's official poverty rate was **27.1%** (22.1% - 32.1%), compared to 18.2% (17.9% - 18.6%) for the state as a whole.⁸
- In 2017, there were **2** child care centers in Lawrence County. Of these **1** were STARS certified.⁹
- Between 2012-2016, **1.7%** (+/-0.6%) of people ages 5 and over spoke a language other than English at home.⁷
- The Urban Institute estimates that **9%** people in Lawrence County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had student loan debt compared to 16% for the state.¹⁰

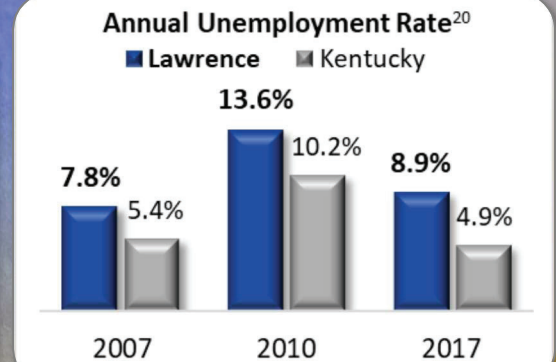

- In 2012, the total market value of agricultural products sold in Lawrence County was **\$1,564,000**.¹³
- Of the total market value of agricultural products sold, **53.4%** was the value of crops and **46.6%** was the value of livestock, poultry, and their products.¹³
- The total farm production expenses (average per farm) was **\$9,352** compared to \$62,002 for the state.¹³
- In Lawrence County, there were **110** hired farm labor workers on **58** farms.¹³
- 96.9%** of farms were operated by a family or an individual compared to 91.0% for the state.¹³

* A farm must sell at least \$5,000 to be defined as a farm operation.

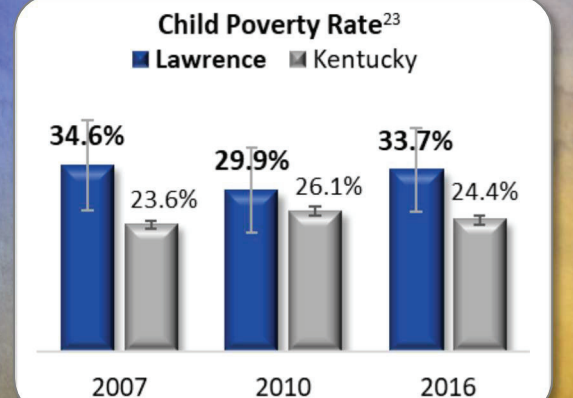

- In 2017, the number of private establishments covered by unemployment insurance in Lawrence County was **35** for goods-producing, **205** for service-providing, and **25** for hospitality & leisure.¹⁸
- Between 2012 and 2016, of the **4,887** (+/- 352) workers ages 16 and over, **51.5%** (+/- 4.2%) worked inside the county, **32.1%** (+/-2.7%) worked outside the county and **16.4%** (+/-2.7%) worked outside Kentucky.⁷
- Between 2012 and 2016, **2.6%** (+/-1.3%) of workers ages 16 and over who worked full-time year round were below poverty compared to 3.5% (+/- 0.1%) for the state as a whole.⁷
- 11.8%** of 2016 HS graduates in the county earned an industry certificate compared to 19.2% for the state.¹⁹

24.5% of students entered KY public postsecondary institutions underprepared in one or more subjects (2015).²¹

- Between 2012-2016, there were an estimated **98** (+/-50) youth ages 5-17 who had a disability.⁷
- 31.0%** of 3rd grade students in Lawrence County scored proficient or distinguished on math in the 2015-16 school year compared to 47.7% for the state.²²
- 1,152** (+/- 250) youth under age 18 lived in households that received supplemental security income (SSI), cash public assistance, or food stamps/SNAP in the past 12 months (2012-2016).⁷
