

- The estimated food insecurity rate for Letcher County is 20.4%, compared to 15.5% for the state.²⁷
- From 2010 to 2016, the number of grocery stores <u>decreased</u> by 42.9%, from 7 to 4 stores.¹⁶
- In 2013-2015, 34.7% (29.7%-40.1%) of adults ages 20 and over reported no leisure time physical activity.²⁴
- The Urban Institute estimates that **32%** of people in Letcher County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had medical debt in collections compared to 27% for the state as a whole.¹⁰
- **16.5%** (11.3%-23.4%) of adults reported that there was a time in past year when they needed to see a doctor but could not because of the cost.²⁵


The overall goals for the Community Assessments are:

- From 2010 to 2017, the total population in Letcher County decreased by -2,180 people.²
- Between April 2010 and June 2017, there was an estimated <u>net out migration</u> of -1,872 people.⁴
- In 2016, the composition of Letcher County's population is estimated to be **97.7**% White, **0.6**% Black/African American, **0.2**% Asian, **0.8**% other and 2 or more races, and **0.7**% Hispanic.⁵
- From 2017 to 2025, the total population in Letcher County is projected to decrease by -1,192 people.3
- As baby boomers are entering retirement, between 2010 and 2025 the population ages 65 and over in Letcher County are **projected** to **increase** by **37.6%** compared to 51.9% for the state as a whole.³







- In 2016, Letcher County's official poverty rate was **31.6%** (27.2% 36.0%), compared to 18.2% (17.9% 18.6%) for the state as a whole.⁸
- In 2017, there were **6** child care centers in Letcher County. Of these **6** were STARS certified.⁹
- Between 2012-2016, 1.0% (+/-0.4%) of people ages 5 and over spoke a language other than English at home.
- The Urban Institute estimates that **10%** people in Letcher County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had student loan debt compared to 16% for the state.¹⁰

- In 2012, the total market value of agricultural products sold in Letcher County was \$133,000.13
- Of the total market value of agricultural products sold, **65.1%** was the value of crops and **34.9%** was the value of livestock, poultry, and their products.¹³
- The total farm production expenses (average per farm) was \$5,604 compared to \$62,002 for the state. 13
- In Letcher County, there were 12 hired farm labor workers on 10 farms.¹³
- 98.2% of farms were operated by a family or an individual compared to 91.0% for the state. 13






- In 2017, the number of private establishments covered by unemployment insurance in Letcher County was **38** for goods-producing, **343** for service-providing, and **26** for hospitality & leisure. ¹⁸
- Between 2012 and 2016, of the **7,214** (+/- 556) workers ages 16 and over, **72.2%** (+/- 3.8%) worked inside the county, **20.1%** (+/-2.3%) worked outside the county and **7.7%** (+/-2.3%) worked outside Kentucky.⁷
- Between 2012 and 2016, **6.6%** (+/-2.7%) of workers ages 16 and over who worked full-time year round were below poverty compared to 3.5% (+/-0.1%) for the state as a whole.⁷
- 40.3% of 2016 HS graduates in the county earned an industry certificate compared to 19.2% for the state. 19

32.3% of students entered KY public postsecondary institutions underprepared in one or more subjects (2015).²¹

- Between 2012-2016, there were an estimated 329 (+/-119) youth ages 5-17 who had a disability.
- **42.8%** of 3rd grade students in Letcher County scored proficient or distinguished on math in the 2015-16 school year compared to 47.7% for the state.²²
- **2,516** (+/- 391) youth under age 18 lived in households that received supplemental security income (SSI), cash public assistance, or food stamps/SNAP in the past 12 months (2012-2016).⁷
