

- The estimated food insecurity rate for McLean County is 13.0%, compared to 15.5% for the state.<sup>27</sup>
- From 2010 to 2016, the number of grocery stores <u>decreased</u> by 20.0%, from 5 to 4 stores.<sup>16</sup>
- In 2013-2015, **33.0%** (25.9%-40.8%) of adults ages 20 and over reported no leisure time physical activity.<sup>24</sup>
- The Urban Institute estimates that 30% of people in McLean County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had medical debt in collections compared to 27% for the state as a whole. 10
- 10.7% (3.7%-27.3%) of adults reported that there was a time in past year when they needed to see a doctor but could not because of the cost.<sup>25</sup>


The overall goals for the Community Assessments are:



- From 2010 to 2017, the total population in McLean County decreased by -330 people.<sup>2</sup>
- Between April 2010 and June 2017, there was an estimated **net out migration** of **-235** people.<sup>4</sup>
- In 2016, the composition of McLean County's population is estimated to be 96.3% White, 0.8% Black/African American, **0.2%** Asian, **1.3%** other and 2 or more races, and **1.5%** Hispanic.<sup>5</sup>
- From 2017 to 2025, the total population in McLean County is **projected** to **decrease** by **-221** people.<sup>3</sup>
- As baby boomers are entering retirement, between 2010 and 2025 the population ages 65 and over in McLean County are projected to increase by 29.5% compared to 51.9% for the state as a whole.3



- In 2016, McLean County's official poverty rate was 17.3% (14.2% 20.4%), compared to 18.2% (17.9% 18.6%) for the state as a whole.8
- In 2017, there were 2 child care centers in McLean County. Of these 1 were STARS certified.9
- Between 2012-2016, 1.9% (+/-0.5%) of people ages 5 and over spoke a language other than English at home.<sup>7</sup>
- The Urban Institute estimates that 15% people in McLean County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had student loan debt compared to 16% for the state. 10

- In 2012, the total market value of agricultural products sold in McLean County was \$179,745,000.13
- Of the total market value of agricultural products sold, 32.1% was the value of crops and 67.9% was the value of livestock, poultry, and their products.<sup>13</sup>
- The total farm production expenses (average per farm) was \$322,125 compared to \$62,002 for the state.<sup>13</sup>
- In McLean County, there were **471** hired farm labor workers on **129** farms. <sup>13</sup>
- 90.1% of farms were operated by a family or an individual compared to 91.0% for the state. 13





- In 2017, the number of private establishments covered by unemployment insurance in McLean County was 42 for goods-producing, 142 for service-providing, and 13 for hospitality & leisure. 18
- Between 2012 and 2016, of the 3,883 (+/- 202) workers ages 16 and over, 41.2% (+/- 4.4%) worked inside the county, **55.0%** (+/-1.6%) worked outside the county and **3.9%** (+/-1.6%) worked outside Kentucky.<sup>7</sup>
- Between 2012 and 2016, 4.0% (+/-1.9%) of workers ages 16 and over who worked full-time year round were below poverty compared to 3.5% (+/- 0.1%) for the state as a whole.<sup>7</sup>
- 8.1% of 2016 HS graduates in the county earned an industry certificate compared to 19.2% for the state.<sup>19</sup>

**21.3%** of students entered KY public postsecondary institutions underprepared in one or more subjects (2015).<sup>21</sup>

- Between 2012-2016, there were an estimated 123 (+/-56) youth ages 5-17 who had a disability.<sup>7</sup>
- 52.1% of 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students in McLean County scored proficient or distinguished on math in the 2015-16 school year compared to 47.7% for the state.<sup>22</sup>
- 764 (+/- 180) youth under age 18 lived in households that received supplemental security income (SSI), cash public assistance, or food stamps/SNAP in the past 12 months (2012-2016).<sup>7</sup>
