


Mercer County Data Profile

Mercer County's Data Profile is provided by the **Kentucky: By The Numbers** program in the Department of Community and Leadership Development for the Community Assessments conducted by the University of Kentucky's Cooperative Extension Service. These secondary data profiles supplement the survey, focus groups, and key informant interviews conducted in each county across the state through the County Extension Offices and coordinated by Community and Economic Development Initiative of Kentucky (CEDIK).

The overall goals for the Community Assessments are:

- To gain a better understanding of the county's pressing issues;
- To enhance Extension's place-based approach by providing information on locally relevant issues in counties;
- To gain a better understanding of how Extension can support important community change to improve Kentucky;
- To provide a statewide view of how top issues are distributed across the state.


• From 2010 to 2017, the total population in Mercer County increased by 190 people.²

- Between April 2010 and June 2017, there was an estimated <u>net in migration</u> of 268 people.⁴
- In 2016, the composition of Mercer County's population is estimated to be 91.2% White, 3.4% Black/African American, 0.6% Asian, 2.1% other and 2 or more races, and 2.7% Hispanic.⁵
- From 2017 to 2025, the total population in Mercer County is **projected** to **decrease** by **-266** people.³
- As baby boomers are entering retirement, between 2010 and 2025 the population ages 65 and over in Mercer County are <u>projected</u> to <u>increase</u> by 42.3% compared to 51.9% for the state as a whole.³




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
In 2016, Mercer County's official poverty rate was 14.5% (11.7% - 17.3%), compared to 18.2% (17.9% - 18.6%) for the state as a whole.⁸

- In 2017, there were 8 child care centers in Mercer County. Of these 7 were STARS certified.⁹
- Between 2012-2016, **3.2%** (+/-1.0%) of people ages 5 and over spoke a language other than English at home.⁷
- The Urban Institute estimates that **17%** people in Mercer County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had student loan debt compared to 16% for the state.¹⁰



- In 2012, the total market value of agricultural products sold in Mercer County was \$50,677,000.¹³
- Of the total market value of agricultural products sold, **18.6%** was the value of crops and **81.4%** was the value of livestock, poultry, and their products.¹³
- The total farm production expenses (average per farm) was \$50,447 compared to \$62,002 for the state.¹³
- In Mercer County, there were 650 hired farm labor workers on 215 farms.¹³
- 93.1% of farms were operated by a family or an individual compared to 91.0% for the state.¹³

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
In 2017, the number of private establishments covered by unemployment insurance in Mercer County was 80 for goods-producing, 351 for service-providing, and 47 for hospitality & leisure.¹⁸

- Between 2012 and 2016, of the 9,281 (+/- 388) workers ages 16 and over, 53.0% (+/- 3.6%) worked inside the county, 46.3% (+/-0.5%) worked outside the county and 0.7% (+/-0.5%) worked outside Kentucky.⁷
- Between 2012 and 2016, **3.0%** (+/-1.4%) of workers ages 16 and over who worked full-time year round were below poverty compared to 3.5% (+/- 0.1%) for the state as a whole.⁷
- 15.5% of 2016 HS graduates in the county earned an industry certificate compared to 19.2% for the state.¹⁹

- Between 2012-2016, there were an estimated **280** (+/-126) youth ages 5-17 who had a disability.⁷
- **33.1%** of 3rd grade students in Mercer County scored proficient or distinguished on math in the 2015-16 school year compared to 47.7% for the state.²²
- 1,394 (+/- 269) youth under age 18 lived in households that received supplemental security income (SSI), cash public assistance, or food stamps/SNAP in the past 12 months (2012-2016).⁷

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The estimated food insecurity rate for Mercer County is **13.9%**, compared to 15.5% for the state.²⁷

- From 2010 to 2016, the number of grocery stores decreased by 42.9%, from 7 to 4 stores.¹⁶
- In 2013-2015, **33.7%** (26.9%-41.1%) of adults ages 20 and over reported no leisure time physical activity.²⁴
- The Urban Institute estimates that 27% of people in Mercer County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had . medical debt in collections compared to 27% for the state as a whole.¹⁰
- 9.8% (3.4%-25.0%) of adults reported that there was a time in past year when they needed to see a doctor but could not because of the cost.²⁵
