- The estimated food insecurity rate for Powell County is **17.3%**, compared to 15.5% for the state.²⁷
- From 2010 to 2016, the number of grocery stores increased by 33.3%, from 3 to 4 stores.¹⁶
- In 2013-2015, **33.7%** (26.1%-41.6%) of adults ages 20 and over reported no leisure time physical activity.²⁴
- The Urban Institute estimates that **34%** of people in Powell County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had medical debt in collections compared to 27% for the state as a whole.¹⁰
- N/A (N/A-N/A) of adults reported that there was a time in past year when they needed to see a doctor but could not because of the cost.²⁵



- From 2010 to 2017, the total population in Powell County decreased by -239 people.²

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

In 2016, Powell County's official poverty rate was **26.5%** (21.7% - 31.3%), compared to 18.2% (17.9% - 18.6%) for the state as a whole.⁸

- In 2017, there were 9 child care centers in Powell County. Of these 4 were STARS certified.⁹
- Between 2012-2016, **1.2%** (+/-0.5%) of people ages 5 and over spoke a language other than English at home.⁷
- The Urban Institute estimates that 11% people in Powell County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had student loan debt compared to 16% for the state.¹⁰



In 2012, the total market value of agricultural products sold in Powell County was \$2,467,000.¹³

- Of the total market value of agricultural products sold, 63.4% was the value of crops and 36.6% was the value of livestock, poultry, and their products.¹³
- The total farm production expenses (average per farm) was **\$15,513** compared to \$62,002 for the state.¹³
- In Powell County, there were **135** hired farm labor workers on **61** farms.¹³
- 94.8% of farms were operated by a family or an individual compared to 91.0% for the state.¹³

* A farm must sell at least \$5,000 to be defined as a farm operation.



- **17.3%** of 2016 HS graduates in the county earned an industry certificate compared to 19.2% for the state.¹⁹


