

- The estimated food insecurity rate for Trimble County is 13.1%, compared to 15.5% for the state.<sup>27</sup>
- From 2010 to 2016, the number of grocery stores did not change by 0.0%, from 1 to 1 stores. 16
- In 2013-2015, 28.9% (20.7%-37.5%) of adults ages 20 and over reported no leisure time physical activity.<sup>24</sup>
- The Urban Institute estimates that 32% of people in Trimble County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had medical debt in collections compared to 27% for the state as a whole.<sup>10</sup>
- 18.1% (6.9%-39.9%) of adults reported that there was a time in past year when they needed to see a doctor but could not because of the cost.<sup>25</sup>


The overall goals for the Community Assessments are:

- From 2010 to 2017, the total population in Trimble County decreased by -248 people.<sup>2</sup>
- Between April 2010 and June 2017, there was an estimated **net out migration** of **-335** people.<sup>4</sup>
- In 2016, the composition of Trimble County's population is estimated to be 94.4% White, 0.5% Black/African American, **0.5%** Asian, **1.8%** other and 2 or more races, and **2.9%** Hispanic.<sup>5</sup>
- From 2017 to 2025, the total population in Trimble County is **projected** to **decrease** by -7 people.<sup>3</sup>
- As baby boomers are entering retirement, between 2010 and 2025 the population ages 65 and over in Trimble County are projected to increase by 65.2% compared to 51.9% for the state as a whole.<sup>3</sup>







- In 2016, Trimble County's official poverty rate was 14.8% (11.7% 17.9%), compared to 18.2% (17.9% 18.6%) for the state as a whole.<sup>8</sup>
- In 2017, there were **3** child care centers in Trimble County. Of these **1** were STARS certified.<sup>9</sup>
- Between 2012-2016, 2.5% (+/-1.5%) of people ages 5 and over spoke a language other than English at home.
- The Urban Institute estimates that **14%** people in Trimble County with a credit bureau record in 2016 had student loan debt compared to 16% for the state.<sup>10</sup>

- Of the total market value of agricultural products sold, **73.6%** was the value of crops and **26.4%** was the value of livestock, poultry, and their products.<sup>13</sup>
- The total farm production expenses (average per farm) was \$21,779 compared to \$62,002 for the state. 13
- In Trimble County, there were 362 hired farm labor workers on 99 farms.<sup>13</sup>
- 96.4% of farms were operated by a family or an individual compared to 91.0% for the state. 13





- In 2017, the number of private establishments covered by unemployment insurance in Trimble County was **19** for goods-producing, **77** for service-providing, and **7** for hospitality & leisure. <sup>18</sup>
- Between 2012 and 2016, of the **3,593** (+/- 276) workers ages 16 and over, **27.7%** (+/- 5.0%) worked inside the county, **52.6%** (+/-4.2%) worked outside the county and **19.7%** (+/-4.2%) worked outside Kentucky.<sup>7</sup>
- Between 2012 and 2016, **4.0%** (+/-3.0%) of workers ages 16 and over who worked full-time year round were below poverty compared to 3.5% (+/- 0.1%) for the state as a whole.<sup>7</sup>
- 21.0% of 2016 HS graduates in the county earned an industry certificate compared to 19.2% for the state. 19

**12.8%** of students entered KY public postsecondary institutions underprepared in one or more subjects (2015).<sup>21</sup>

- Between 2012-2016, there were an estimated **48** (+/-37) youth ages 5-17 who had a disability.<sup>7</sup>
- **40.6%** of 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students in Trimble County scored proficient or distinguished on math in the 2015-16 school year compared to 47.7% for the state.<sup>22</sup>
- 478 (+/- 184) youth under age 18 lived in households that received supplemental security income (SSI), cash public assistance, or food stamps/SNAP in the past 12 months (2012-2016).<sup>7</sup>
