

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
**McLean County


**Average Household Expenditures: Southern Region,

*(Data are not specific to this county, but are for the same income group in the Southern Region as the median income estimated in 1993 for this county.)*



**Monthly Unemployment Rates, 1990-1997**




**Households Without Personal Transportation
